Vice Commodore's Message Will Smith



Prepare the Dreams

As you all know, the future of our club is in transition. Our lease will not be renewed at the end of November as Treasure Island begins redevelopment. This means that the building that we have called home will be torn down as part of the geotechnical improvements that are prerequisites to construction. TIDA has promised to locate us in suitable accommodations, perhaps in the basement of Building One.

Reaching far beyond the challenge of relocation of our facilities, redevelopment represents a great opportunity for our club members to redefine our mission and establish a new identity within the bay area community.

For decades, TIYC has maintained its visibility in PICYA, Opening Day, and an annual race or two. Each one of these endeavors has taken work and passion from the members who chose to organize and participate in the event. There's only so much that each of us can do, so no matter

how passionate we are, a small team has a small presence. Conversely, a large team can have a large presence....and we are growing larger.

We saw this on June 13th during our "REALLY BIG CRUISE IN" with both the Alameda and Oakland clubs. The big observation was that while these two clubs are quite visible in the community, they're not colossal 1000+ member clubs; they're only a shade over 200 members each.

This weekend, not only did TIYC host two clubs in our clubhouse, but another organization hosted over 50 boats in a raft-up of epic scale in Clipper Cove. Not bad for a cove that's silting-in so badly that real yachts shouldn't even bother. Not bad also for a no-clubhouse-non-yacht-club that's just a bunch of young goofballs connected by social media. Got that? A 50 boat cruise-out, and they're not even organized. They do this every month! Maybe they just have a bad habit.

It's clear that the role of the yacht club in the community at large is changing. How will we participate in that change? We have a thousand choices. The present plan of record for Treasure Island is 8000 residences, many of them in high rise steel and glass towers, along with a marina of 400 slips. Sounds like a mecca for the very wealthy. Is that the community we should serve? That's one choice: an exclusive private club for the 1%. That could be exciting. Big boats, big money, big egos...really BIG. So big that it creates its own synthetic reality. There's merit in that pursuit.

Two extremes: A no-clubhouse-non-yacht-club-social-media-goofball-bunch (that Reggie and I had a blast with last year), or the synthetic reality of Big Ego Island. Our reality will be somewhere in between. The point is that we have a blank canvas ahead of us. We have an opportunity to express ourselves in a way never before possible. Let's look at the example of the Westpoint Regatta. A few of our members, most notably Russ Breed, understand the importance of club participation in high visibility events. Relentless as always, Russ nudged at every opportunity and slowly infected a few others who suddenly "got it" and ran like bloodhounds. Everyone knows someone who can help, and when there are more of us, there are more threads connecting our club to the community at large. So the victims of Russ's infection (MeeSun and Parke) nudged a few people they knew, and suddenly there's a commercial sponsor for the race, a special Pre-Party in the city, promotional posters, higher visibility signage at the event, and Treasure Island Yacht Club takes its place among the clubs that do stuff.

TIYC is not a dying yacht club marooned on a small patch of sinking mud adjacent to a small cove that's slowly silting-in. In large part, we get to decide what Treasure Island Yacht Club will become. During development, we have an opportunity to dream bigger dreams and achieve the unexpected, but unless the few of us can shoulder the load, we will need many new members. Let's get motivated by imagining what we can be with more members. Suppose we want a clubhouse of about 20,000 sq ft. Unnecessary for a club of our size, but if the island grows to 8000 homes, it might be considered small. What might that facility be like?

How can we buy our own clubhouse? There are other clubs we can ask, because they're been through it. Rent for a building like that is \$1/sq ft or more, or about \$20,000 per month at present value, and increasing every year. A commercial mortgage of \$3 million for 30 years at 5% is a bit over \$16,000 per month, and it's fixed price and fixed term. It's still too much for our club: \$360 pp at 65 members.

We don't need 20,000 sq ft right now. That's the benefit of owning our own land and our own building. We can start with a 2500 or 5000 square foot building, then add more as our needs grow. And we may grow faster than you can imagine as has happened with other clubs. Back to the \$16,000 mortgage; it's only \$40 per member per month if we have 400 members. A 5000 square foot building might be the same price per member at 100 members. Without going into great detail, that's about 4 times the space we have now for about double the monthly cost per member. Would you be willing to double your monthly dues to have a bigger, better, newer club?

Our building is only part the challenges we face moving forward. During the period while we and our island are under construction, we will not have a great house to offer our members, so how can we keep our members attention? We need more activities with more access to those activities for our members....but that's a subject for another issue of the Jibe.



The green redevelopment of Treasure and Yerba Buena Islands jumped closer to reality on May 29th when the U.S. Navy transferred nearly 300 acres of land to the city of San Francisco. The city now owns Building One, planned site of the future Treasure Island Museum, and most of the southern half of Treasure Island. The Navy also turned over more than 500 acres of submerged land.

Use of Chits at TIYC

TIYC has two chits, one for member sales (Dinners, etc.) and the other for Bar sales.

Yellow "Honor Bar Sales" chits are to be used if a member wants to be billed OR if there is a liquor, wine or beer cash sale.

No chit is needed for sodas or other non-alcoholic cash sales like snacks, Kureg coffee, hot chocolate, etc. Simply pass the money through the mail slot in the office door.

HOWEVER, If the sale includes both alcohol and non-alcoholic cash sales a chit should be filled out. This assures proper accounting with Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC).

After filling out the chit including the Total Amount of the sale, Chits Must Be Dated,

The appropriate boxes checked regarding payment.

THE "BUCKET LIST"

(Reports from our Non-Resident members)

The coast of Maine is a VERY "interesting" cruise destination

Ah, where to begin? just now returned from Vinalhaven Islands via State ferry, perhaps the heart of Maine's lobster fishing center & where many of these islands are inhabited, about 1200 year around and several thousand during prime tourist season. Though now mid-June, had my selection of bicycle rental and no crowds. Temps there in the 60's while in the 70's today, mainland. It's an hour by ferry (RT \$17.50), maybe 20 miles. Artists would love the local scenes.

Yesterday was Bar Harbor for me. It's been THE destination for perhaps 100 years. Far too rich and touristy for me yet outstanding scenery on the edge of Acadian National forest. Plenty to see coming/going. Suggest food & shelter coming/going & nothing is inexpensive once there. In general food in Maine is excellent though prices similar to S.F. proper. Prices of other necessities are competitive.

It's a boating paradise, sail or power, IF you have one here. There must be several thousand inhabited islands along this jagged coastline & far more, beyond number, not inhabited.

Portland is a small, vintage city. Access to numerous destinations & islands there yet I prefer those farther away, though unnecessary.

Booth Bay is another great destination. Many of these are reachable within a few hours, have bridges from island to island. Many sea side areas are private though one can see them. Off of Lincoln, just above Camden, is a short ferry ride to an island where John Travolta & Kristi Alley frequent. I saw neither of them when there, yet they are sometimes spotted.

Flowers & scenery match or surpass all I've experienced in CA & that's saying something. However, this is an area to stay away from during winter months, unless a masochist, snow shoer, skier or one of that ilk. I have some great pics though all on my cell phone & I'm terrible about making/showing albums.

A place by the name of Owlshead has the best "transportation museum" I've ever witnessed.....Rockefeller & money of others too.....planes, antique cars from day one, you name it. Google the place.

That's all for now, about to lose my wifi connection

And From Europe we heard from Matt Farsworth

Yes, I had meant to write when the packet arrived, about two weeks ago. Many thanks to my mysterious benefactor. I hope I can visit the Bay this autumn for some sailing and to use my new membership card.

Sorry, I didn't write sooner. We were planning to visit and stay with friends in Paris for the weekend, but the fares had gone up and we found a great deal on a last minute package to Crete with a Russian tour company -- all included air fare, hotel, three meals a day, and beverages (beer, wine and cocktails from 10am to 11pm). What deal, 7 nights for one weeks salary after taxes! had to go! So, didn't get around to writing back. We spent most days by the beach, the pool and walking around the local town and three days on exploring.

Last weekend we went to visit Pärnu Yacht Club in southern Estonia

(http://www.jahtklubi.ee/index.php?id=219). They seem to be a very active club. They have, in the past, hosted ice sailing, had a member sail around the world, have sail training, youth sailing regattas in Optimist and Laser, and will host the ORC national and Volvo Euro Championship in early August. I recognized the Commodore from his picture, but he left the building before I could introduce myself. I had wanted to get a photo. We were both wearing red pants that day. On the Thursday last, at a technology start up conference in Tallinn, I met a lawyer I know from Palo Alto. He was also wearing red pants and mentioned that he had been at a yacht club where he was told that red pants were a symbol of having sailed across the Atlantic. I had not heard that before.

It seems that the yacht clubs here do not have the same tax situation as in the US, so hospitality is open to the public. I think racing season has begun at Piirta, Tallinn Yacht Club, which was the former Olympic sailing venue. I saw some boats racing on Sat from our apartment balcony, and Wednesday nights should start soon.

I am in good spirits and health. I have been working here for Bang & Olufsen, a Danish company that has had a software development studio here for the past nine years. As an international company, we are speaking English at work -- actually, only when I am around (I was their first non-Estonian speaking hire in Tallinn). I have enjoyed working here very much, but sadly, in order to reduce workforce expenses, the office will close at the end of June. Everyone here has been very kind and welcoming to me.

Women's Sailing

Lynette Breed and Sally Crompton recently travelled to Boston to attend The 14th annual Women's Sailing Conference

On June 6th, the Corinthian Yacht Club in Marblehead, MA, hosted the 14th annual Women's Sailing Conference, an all-day event of on-the-water coaching and on-land seminars. Corinthian Yacht Club Rear Commodore Annie Harris welcomed the 90 attendees in the morning. The weather was cool, with gentle winds, but by noon the winds were blowing out of the north at a good 15 knots with higher gusts. By the end of the day, the seas and wind had calmed down considerably.

The workshop offerings were numerous, and ranged from a basic primer on sailing and safety at sea, to diesel engine and head mechanics, to more in depth topics: on-board electrical wiring, electronics, and offshore heavy weather sailing. On-the water, women received coaching on sail trim, taking the helm, and retrieving someone from the water.

The majority of women participants were from New England, but also included women from California, Pennsylvania, Kansas and Michigan. Donna Lange, who will embark on her second solo circumnavigation from Bristol, RI, in July attended. Capt. Nancy Erley of Seattle, WA, also a circumnavigator, presented Donna with good luck stones to bring calmness during the unsettling seas she will encounter.

Proceeds from the raffles and silent auction benefitted the Women's Sailing Foundation, (WSF) which funds its *AdventureSail®* program and scholarships for young girls at-risk. In addition, this year WSF provided a scholarship for an underserved teenage girl to join the all-women-crewed schooner, *Adventuress*, for a week's sailing instruction with other teen girls in the San Juan Islands.

Linda Newland, current NWSA President is a Past Commodore of PICYA and of Island Yacht Club in Alameda. She is one of the founders of IYC's Women's Sailing Seminar, the 22nd of which will be held in September this year. More to follow on their upcoming seminar.

Why File a Float Plan

Several times each season, BoatUS Marine Insurance gets a phone call from a distressed spouse--a boat is overdue. Maybe the missing skipper "is always home by a certain hour" or "has never been this late before." The overdue skipper almost always calls; everything is fine. But a lot of worry and frustration could have been prevented by taking a few minutes to file a float plan.

A float plan lets your family and friends know your whereabouts and, should a trip come to grief, the plan will give the searchers a valuable head start locating your boat.

Whether you are on the water for an afternoon or a month-long excursion, a float plan can be

a lifesaver. Print out our easy to use form (below), fill it in and leave it with a spouse, other relative and/or a friend. You may even want to leave a copy with your marina manager.

The Float Plan starts with the basics: phone numbers to be called if the boat is overdue, a description of the boat, registration numbers, etc., that can be penciled in at the start of the season. Copies can then be made and details added before each trip.

Note: The Coast Guard does not accept float plans and should only be notified by your spouse or friend if there is a "deviation" (you are overdue) from the float plan.
