From the Commodore

We are going to try a couple of new things. Our membership consists of a little over 200, of which around 125 are committed to the building fund. Presumably these 125 will stay with us as we transform into a civilian yacht club, which means that the other 80 or so will leave us. It is your management's belief that we need more members to evolve into a truly viable club: therefore we are going to go on a membership drive, with incentives to those who bring in new members. Details of this program are elsewhere in this .IIBE.

Second, we are going to reorganize our volunteer program. It was brought to my attention that this Club is perceived to be run by a dozen or so individuals to the exclusion of input from all the rest. We want to change that. Everything that is done (or not done) in this club is done by volunteer members except: (1) running the office and the clubhouse, (2) janitorial service during the week and (3) the hiring of bartenders and cooking staff during events. There are many other things that contribute to the operation of our Club, and because we can't afford to hire staff to do them, we need members to volunteer their help. Some members have complained that there doesn't seem to be any organized way to include them in this volunteer effort. We are going to change that. At the sugggestion of Paul Smith, a plan has

evolved which should do the job. This plan is described elsewhere in this JIBE, and we hope that it will satisfy all of our members who feel that they have been left out of participating in the operation of our Club. The plan is intended to get everyone involved so that we give to our members what they expect of a yacht club. The Bridge meeting in May will be at 1830 on Tuesday, May 9. A light supper will be served.

plan offered by **Paul Smith** and sanctioned by the Bridge is as follows:

Each of the following members has been given a committee job. A chairperson must be picked who will be in charge of plans, programs and committee assignment sheets. The chairperson's job is to delegate a job to each committee member, and explain what to do and when and where to do it. Paul's word's follow:

"The TIYC is a self-help, low-cost organization that has so far functioned because a very few did all the work. Now that we are changing into a larger club, this method of operation will not work. In order to keep costs down and dues low and remain a self-help club we are going to have to assign duties to every local member. We have tried asking for volunteers and it has not worked *but* when members have been assigned duties, they have tended to carry them out - for instance, the watch duty.

So, here we have our assigned committee duties for 1995. We all have an assigned jobs; and, as with our watch bill, if we do not show up on our committee assignments we will be fined \$50.00. This may sound steep. There are always circumstances that can interfere with our duties. We will be fair, but advance notice and a sincere attempt to have someone else switch duties will be imperative to being excused.

If you would rather serve on another committee than the one you are assigned, here is what you can do:

- 1. Find someone willing to switch with you.
- 2. Call your committee Chairperson and see if he knows someone who wants to join his committee.

- 3. Call **Joyce Pucci**, our Club Manager and see if she can help.
- 4. Grin and bear it. The year will be over on Nov. 1, 1995 and by then you will probably have found out your assignment can be a lot of fun, with great members to help you do the job.
- 5. Next year you may be able to pick your assignment, if you get your assignment form back early. And for those who have plans of flying a Commodore's flag, remember, Big Brother will be watching your efforts to make TIYC a better club".

Some notes: When you do committee work, this acts as your "club duty". That means that when you actively do a committee project, you do not have to stand a watch. Also, not all members of the committee have to join in each project. Projects may involve activities that are only done once or twice a year, like yard clean up or maintenance of a particular area, bartending for a club function, etc.

Sandbar Soundings



Most of us who have traversed Clipper Cove at all realize that there is a rather extensive area of low water at the east side of the cove. Chart 18649, San Francisco Bay, produced by NOAA is based on 1927 datum. The chart does not show a sandbar in the cove area.

At the suggestion of Harbormaster Bob Wilcox, I conducted two surveys using a portable fathometer. The first was at the mid-tide on 29 March 1995. The second was on 19 April on a minus .9 tide. Difficulties in identifying the perimeter of the bar were based on the lack of landmarks on the chart. However, the approximate location I have indicated on the accompanying sketch.

At mid-tide on 29 March 1995, I found that there were 7 feet over the bar, which appeared to have a level surface with no valleys or mounds. On 19 April, when the tide was -.9, there were 3 feet over the bar. The skeg of the inflatable dinghy outboard motor was dragging across the bottom. Fortunately, it was a soft bottom.

At the eastern margin of the bar, there was an abrupt transition from 11 feet to 3 feet. I assume that the strong north and south currents that run under the Bay Bridge and alongside the cove have caused that sharp demarcation line. On the north edge of the bar, the demarcation was 3 feet over the bar then a drop to 6 feet. On the east side the drop was 3 to 8 feet. (cont'd on Page 7)

On a normal high tide, I would suggest that traversing the bar would be no problem for even 7 foot draft boats. At mid-time, it's OK for shallow draft boats, drawing not over 5 feet. At low and lower low tide, all boats should stay clear.

My thanks to Dave Rachford and Judith Atkinson for their fine assistance as boat drivers.

On May 27 we will have our race-cruise to Vallejo. Race-cruise means that those who want to race may, and those who want to cruise to the Vallejo Y. C. for the long weekend are also welcome. The race will be a "special race" and trophies will be awarded after the race to the first three places.

There will be no skipper's meeting, and the starting line for this race will be where the finish line is for regular races. This is an imaginary line between a bouy about 100 yds. off the harbormaster's dock and the yard on the dock. Presumably this will give you an upwind start.

The course will be across San Francisco Bay, up San Pablo Bay and will finish at an imaginary line between marks 1 and 2 at the mouth of the Napa River. Mark 2 is the red mark on the pole on the right side of the entrance to the river, and mark 1 is the green mark on the opposite side.

The Race Committee will raise the white shape on the harbormaster's dock for the starting sequence at 1000. Red shape and start at 1010. All boats start at the same time. There will not be a committee boat at the finish. Each skipper is responsible for taking his or her finish time. Time should be taken from the foreward cockpit bulkhead, and should include hour, minutes and seconds when the vessel passes between marks 1 and 2. Set your watches to the raising of the white shape at 1000. This is necessary in order to report a correct finish time.

Skippers should report finish times to me aboard "Southern Comfort" immediately upon arriving at the Vallejo Yacht Club. Communications will be on channel 72.
