# STAFF COMMODORE BYLAWS REPORT

It is time to make a slight revision to our bylaws. Our membership is presently limited to military-connected families, members of the Coast Guard Auxiliary, and Federal employees. We have been receiving some new members outside these categories on approval of the Commodore, but as our base for recruiting new members diminishes as a result of military installations in this area closing, we must revise our by-laws to allow all approved applicants to join. It is also anticipated that when the City takes over Treasure Island, and Treasure Island Yacht Club is in their plan for reuse, open memberships will be required. We will make wholesale revision to the by-laws this fall when we "convert to a civilian" club, but to ease the enrollment of new members before that, we need to open our membership to all qualified applicants. Therefore, the Board of Directors has recommended that the following changes to the by-laws be approved at this time. We will vote upon these changes at the May general meeting.

Proposed changes to the By-laws:

Article II, section 3. Delete parenthetical phrase "(identified by valid Uniformed Services ID Card)"

Article II, section 4. Change to read "Regular Membership is open to all persons who meet approval of the Membership Committee or the Board of Directors and who have an interest in boating and/or related activities."

# MORE ACCURATE GPS BUT EXPECT ADDITIONAL \$\$\$

Over 275,000 owners have been enjoying 100-meter accuracy or better from the Global Positioning System (GPS), which is pretty good for off-shore work but short of the tolerance needed for the accuracy required for near-shore and coastline work.

The USCG has announced resolution of that problem, however, in building an additional system called Differential GPS (DGPS). The system captures regular GPS signals and rebroadcasts them after correction, resulting in 10-meter accuracy. This service will be available only in range of 47 radio transmitters located along the US coastline which translates to about 125 miles from shore.

Additional equipment is needed to achieve this accuracy which will run in the neighborhood of \$500. DGPS will interface only with a GPS unit which has an appropriate port. Anyone buying a GPS unit who believes he will be interested i n adding a DGPS should look for the manufacturer's label stating that the unit is "Differential Ready" or "Differential Capable."

#### **ABOUT THAT BOAT LOAN!**

Many of you will be happy to hear that the interest on your boat loan may qualify for a deduction. Under current IRS rules, a boat is considered a home if it meets certain criteria, one as it relates to the boat and the other as it relates to the loan on the boat.

The boat must have basic living accomodations such as a sleeping space, a toilet, and cooking facilities. The loan must be secured by the boat as collateral (as opposed to a boat which was purchased on a line of credit),

The taxpayer can only deduct one second home, so if you have a ski cabin in the mountains and a 49-foot Hylas at TIYC, you might want to ask your accountant to check the figures. Those filing for the second home deduction must itemize their tax deductions using Schedule A.

Pass between the Blessing Ship and the Corinthian Yacht Club clubhouse in Tiburon. AT NO TIME pass between the Coast Guard Ship and Angel Island (Pt. Stuart).


5. Exit the Raccoon Strait Restricted Zone at the Southwest end.

AS YOU PASS THE BLESSING SHIP, TAKE A MOMENT TO GAZE UPON THE AMERICAN FLAG PROUDLY HOISTED ABOVE THE CORINTHIAN YACHT CLUB. THIS IS THE VERY FLAG FLOWN FIFTY ONE YEARS AGO ABOVE THE U.S. BATTLESHIP MISSOURI THE DAY JAPANESE FOREIGN MINISTER, MAMORU SHIGEMITSU SIGNED THE FORMAL SURRENDER DOCUMENT ACCEPTED BY GENERAL OF THE ARMIES, DOUGLAS MAC ARTHUR.
