BOAT/US

The acronym, BOAT/US stands for Boat Owner's Association of the United States. Perhaps you've seen some literature around the clubhouse from this organization; boating safety newsletters, boat equipment catalogs, information bro-

chures and membership applications. As cooperating Group Liaison, I place BOAT/US literature out on the long south-facing window bar. TIYC has been a BOAT/US Cooperating Group for as long as I can remember. The organizsation was formed 29-years ago to provide a voice for boaters at the highest level of government, to provide consumer protection, boat insurance, marine towing service. and discounts on boating equipment.

The notorious User Fee tax was repealed following legal action by BOAT/US. The FCC has recently backed off of the \$115/75 VHF licensing fees thanks in part to BOAT/US lobbying. These actions are good for boat owners. We should support an organization that works directly for us. There aren't many around in case you haven't noticed. I'm thinking BOAT/US and RBOC (Recreational Boaters of California) and that's it. In all fairness, I should count the Coast Guard and the Coast Guard Auxilliary.

RBOC is supported by individual donations and an annual contribution made by boating organizations such as TTYC. We give RBOC between \$300 and \$400 a year, depending on the inclination of our Board of Directors. The club as an entity doesn't provide financial contributions to BOAT/US. Our support is provided through individual membership at the low cost of \$8.50 annually. As Cooperating Group members, we pay half of the regular \$17. membership dues. Most of our club officers and directors are members, or will be soon. To receive the group discount, use our Cooperating Group ID number, which is GA 81538Y.

And every 90's yachtsman alive has looked at those pictures in awe and tried to imagine the thrill of being at the tiller.

Elizabeth spent a ton of money bringing her big boat up to its former pristine glory. Only one thing left to do. Call up Hood Sailmakers and ask oblige. Making sails is what they do.



The sail Hood made for Elizabeth has 5,360 sq. feet. of area; 153 feet of hoist; 63 feet of foot, and 20 battens. It was made of 9.4 oz. Vectran, and weighed in at 950 lbs. That is 700 lbs. lighter than its previous polyester sale.

SUSAN HISCOCK, AUTHOR AND CIRCUMNAVIGATOR

Everybody remembers Susan & Eric Hiscock and their three boats, Wanderer I, II, & III. They were best known for their books, Cruising Under Sail and Around the World in Wanderer III, both still in print and available in chandleries and nautical book stores throughout most of the free world.

The Hiscocks embarked on a life of sailing in 1941, they won the Blue Water Medal from the Cruising Club of America in 1955 and were knighted in recognition of their contribution to sailing in 1985. The writings of this remarkable couple were the foundation upon which the unthinkable became thinkable. They were the inspiration for the thousands of circumnavigations that followed.

Eric died in 1986 and a year later, Susan sold Wanderer III, and returned to her native England. There she bought a wooden racing dinghy and took up the sport she had learned as a teenager in the 1930s. She was 80 years old when she won her first race. She finished the season in 14th place.

After cruising for over 40 years, with 3-1/2 circumnavigations to her credit, Susan Hiscock passed away one week before her 82nd birthday at her home at Yarmouth, England on the Isle of Wight on May 12, 1995. A capable mariner and a tribute to those many able ladies who followed.




