PLAN FOR T.I. GOES TO BOARD

A 194-page report containing a reuse plan for Treasure Island went to the Board of Supervisors July 22. The result was unknown at the time of this writing, but the plan describes hotels, film studios, a job training center, and housing for the homeless. The something-for-everyone proposal also envisions a major theme park and a large fleet of fast ferries to shuttle passengers to and from both sides of the bay.

There are, however, some major obstacles, including the issue of earthquake safety, environmental contamination, and the method of financing. Needless to say, an array of both public and private interests are sharpening their pencils in order to establish the level of surmountability these obstacles pose.

In true San Francisco fashion, the homeless and economically disadvantaged will not be overlooked, and the idea is to "integrate" them into the community. They will also get first shot at the construction jobs on the island, as well as an estimated 8000 permanent jobs the project will generate, which includes 5000 jobs with the theme park.

To alleviate the traffic nightmare, the plan requires developers to subsidize cheap and regular ferry service, and envisions a ferry departing every six minutes.

Details surrounding the environmental cleanup project and the stabilization of the island to met earthquake standards are, as yet, unclear.

MI\$\$ED HIS DUTY DAY!!

Sorry I missed my duty day. IOU \$50.

Not to try to make an excuse, but rather to possibly amuse and enlighten, here's the story: I did the Coastal Cup on *Petard*, a Farr 36 owned by Keith Buck of Corinthian. I've been racing with Keith about ten-years. We've done OK: some season championships, 2nd in the Tahiti Cup. Santa Barbara, being pretty much dead downwind, isn't *Petard's* race, but several of us were feeling sea deprivation, yet lacked the time to do Pacific Cup.

The race started noon Saturday, June 39. The line was at Golden Gate Yacht Club. The tide was just short of slack. We had a good start and led our division in the early ebb up the beach. The wind was more South than usual so we tried the South Bay off Baker Beach, after rounding the South Tower. By the time we got to Point Lobos, we were trading the lead with several of our division, depending on who got lucky with the wind and tide. By afternoon, we were where we wanted to be on the course; well to the right, aiming for the South Separation Buoy - near which we set the kite and settled down for some serious downwind.

The wind built in the evening and into the night. It probably got to 20. By itself, 20 knots is no big deal. The joker in the deck was that the wind wave of three to five feet was running from about 350 degrees, but the eight foot swell was running from about 320. The result was some interesting square or triangular waves. The starboard quarter would fall abruptly into a trough every few minutes, whipping the mast and the kite to weather. It was hard to avoid a round-down. About midnight, the sailmaker who relieved me at the helm did it!

We were lucky. The mast stayed in the boat. The only injury was the sailmaker, who go hit upside the face by the mainsheet when the boom jibed, and this was strictly minor. We even got the chute back in- tact. The next watch tried the 1.5 oz on port jibe. Finding it equally problematic, we doused

and, of course, doused our chance at a pickle dish.

Next day, the wind lightened. Finally, Monday dawn, we were chasing zephyrs off of the infamous Point Conception. Reaching at 75 degrees apparent, we jibed through only 100 degrees. Bringing the wind even abeam resulted in a dramatic loss of apparent wind and speed. Gradually during the day, the wind built to about fifteen, allowing us to finish in the late afternoon. The first-to-finish boat was Dan Newland's extreme ultralight, *Pegasus*, about twelve hours ahead of us.

And it was beautiful! Almost no fog. Moonlit nights. Fin whales in abundance.. *Two Scoops* even hit one, which slapped them lightly for their carelessness.

Santa Barbara is a great destination. It's warm, sunny, pretty relaxed and friendly. Whatever the locals may think, to a San Franciscan the relative absence of social/sexual "diversity" is a relief. The club is extremely congenial. Brophy Bros is the waterfront fish restaurant. The Waterfront is the cafe: breakfast, lunch, and the Snapper Veracruz is a good dinner at a competative price. The Santa Cruz Market is convenient for reprovisioning. Ah, yes. Reprovisioning. There's always the question of getting back.

The day after our arrival the West Santa Barbara Channel buoy and Point Arguello were both registering over 25 knots. Seas were up to about ten feet. Hoping that there might be some relief at dawn, we got underway at dinner. Arriving just at sunrise, our night of motorsailing was rewarded by an absence of wind at Point Conception and Arguello: better lucky than good. During the day the wind filled. Shortly before tacking offshore at Port San Luis we tucked in a reef. Shortly after tacking we took another. The seas were still big and confused. The pounding made sleep difficult for the off-watch. After midnight, offshore from San Simeon, the heavy weather jib was struck down on deck. Not having rigged a messenger line for the third reef eliminated that option, so we tacked offshore in dense fog. Although the San Simeon buoy is no longer on the Light List, it is still on station. Using GPS, a sharp pencil and a 250,000 scale

chart, we got it in sight ten degrees on the port bow at about two hundred yards.

There was a little kelp in the anchorage yet, The holding was good on a sand bottom. The Fortress anchor stuck in just fine. The difficulty on a race boat, though, is no dinghy. I hitched a ride to shore with a crew of a forty-five ketch that had turned back from Point Sur, called home, and hitched a ride back with the skipper of a Freedom cat rigged schooner. If I'd remembered a credit card, I could have rented a kayak. The day turned out to be sunny and beautiful, if cool and breezy. The fog line, just offshore, was ripping along and piling up on Point Buchon, to the South. I felt pretty good after a three hour nap. Everybody else slept six hours or more. We had a Top Shelf dinner with some red wine, which had been shaken, not stirred, for the last several days.

Next morning we were up for another try at it. About ten miles of Piedras Blancas, with the third reef and the heavy weather jib, we were under control but taking a pretty thorough beating. Considering that it could be worse at Sur, and that we would then be exhausted, we bagged it and returned to Morro Bay. The gracious hospitality of the Yacht Club was much appreciated. We secured *Petard* and a rental car.

Arriving home after midnight on the fifth, I only realized late on the afternoon of the sixth, as I was rinsing and hanging my gear, that it was my day at the club.

Oh, Well. Sorry.





Election of Officers: Pursuant to a resolution passed by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors and subsequently approved by the membership at a meeting held on July 8, 1994, Article IX, Section 2 of the Bylaws was amended to wit; the requirement for a *Secret Ballot* in the election process of Officers and Directors was deleted.

Change to Bylaws

Article IX, Section 2 ELECTION OF OFFICERS. The Officers of the corporation except as stated otherwise in this section, shall be chosen by a nominating committee appointed by the President, which will be comprised of five regular members in good standing; of which, one member will be designated chairman: No member of the committee may be a current member of the Board of Directors, or being considered for office. The committee shall meet in June of each year for the purpose of submitting nominations for Corporation Officers for the succeeding year. Said list of nominees and a line for write in candidates for each office, will be published in the Jibe for consideration by the membership. Absentee ballots shall be published in the Jibe indicating those candidates recommended by the Nominating Committee as well as any other candidates for each office. The distribution of the September Jibe shall precede the September election by at least two (2) weeks. Said election shall occur at the September general meeting, at which time, nominations may be made from the floor. Officers shall be chosen by a majority/pluarity vote of the general membership.

The Secretary shall appoint an Election Committee, comprised of disinterested, objective regular members in good standing. This committee shall verify/record the absentee ballots, received following the commencement of the open floor election process.


