I wasn't in much better shape than I was when I left the meeting.

As you will see in the other two letters, one from Mayor Brown, the other from the United States Navy, "there ain't no going back."

Now for less doom and gloom: we may have found ourselves a new home. As you will read a little later in this Jibe, **George Knies** has made contact with the Coast Guard at Coast Guard Island in Alameda. At this point, the Coast Guard seems very amiable to letting us establish a new home and possibly even use their docking facilities on Coast Guard Island for our club. Rather that steal George's thunder, I will let him explain the ideas that we are working on at this time to reestablish ourselves in a new home.

NO GOING BACK!"

At the last membership meeting at *The Ark* in Alameda, the possibility of relocating, as we knew it at the time, was explained to the 40 members in attendance. With a show of hands of those present, it was determined that we should go ahead with every effort to try to procure whatever accommodations that are presented to us by the Coast Guard.

The June meeting of the Bridge and Board was held at Coast Guard Island, where we toured several locations that had been suggested for our use by the base Commanding Officer.

Later in this issue, you will find a ballot asking for your vote to relocate our club or to continue operating as a paper club, as we have been doing for the past year. I urge you all to please read the following articles and respond with your vote.

It is my opinion, and I believe the opinion of your entire Bridge and Board, that the move to Coast Guard Island will probably be our last opportunity to carry on the proud tradition of the Treasure Island Yacht Club.

Also, for those of you who did not attend our last membership meeting, you missed a really good time, many old friends, and the feeling that Treasure Island Yacht Club still exists.

All Hands:

I have not yet read Harlan's comments on the Friday meeting with the City. I thought I would give you my spin on the meeting before reading his, so as not to influence my still very bad attitude.

RE: T.I.Y.C. SUBLEASE/SUBLICENSE OF SPACE AT TREASURE ISLAND

Dear Mr. Aberer:

This is in response to your letter of 19 March 1998 and a follow up to several phone calls and meetings between Mr. Van Wye of your organization and our Commander Trummer. During those phone calls and meetings, the leasing and licensing process for bases closing under the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) legislation was explained.

Specifically for the former Naval Station Treasure Island, the Department of Defense has recognized the Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA) of the City of San Francisco as the Local Redevelopment Authority (LRA) for the former Naval Station. The Navy works with the LRA prior to conveyance of property to identify opportunities that would promote reuse and creation of jobs. There are two main avenues under which a LRA can gain access to BRAC property prior to conveyance, leasing and licensing. The Navy leases or licenses BRAC property directly to the LRA, not to private entities such as the Yacht Club. With a lease, the LRA may then sublease that property to a private entity if it so chooses, with Navy approval. A license, unlike a lease, does not give exclusive possession of the property to the licensee. Since the Navy only licenses BRAC property to the LRA, there would be no way for a private entity such as the Yacht Club to gain access to property through this option.

To date, the Navy has received no formal or informal request for approval to sublease Building 183 to the Treasure Island Yacht Club from the TIDA or anyone from the City of San Francisco's Treasure Island Project Office. In a telephone call of 6 April 1998, Ms. Annemarie Conroy, the Executive Director of the Treasure Island Development Authority, confirmed with a member of our staff that no request has been sent by that organization to the Navy. Further, she indicated that she had met with you on 3 April 1998 and had made it clear that there would be no sublease for Building 183 to your organization in the foreseeable future.

I hope this letter clarifies any misunderstanding you have regarding this issue. If you have any further questions, my point of contact on this matter is Mr. Kenn Parsons. He may be reached at 650-244-3001.

I am in receipt of the numerous letters requesting the Treasure Island Yacht Club be allowed to return to Building 183 on Treasure Island.

It was reported to me that on Friday, April 3rd you and Treasure Island Yacht Club Vice Commodore Harlan Van Wye met with members of my Treasure Island staff to discuss the issue at length. It was laid out to you then, and I hope you can understand, that we need to keep our options open. We do not anticipate subleasing the building for the exclusive use as a yacht club facility as the best choice for the interim-use of Building 183.

As the conveyance process of Treasure Island and the development of the marina moves forward, we are in the position of having to create a substantial revenue stream to support the island, while at the same time, creating new jobs for citizens of the City and County of San Francisco.

Please relay to your club membership, that Treasure Island Marina and the use of Clipper Cove are available for all boaters. While we currently do not have the modern conveniences found at other bay area marinas, I have made it a priority to begin to create amenities for visitors to Clipper Cove. We continue to offer spectacular views, friendly staff, and a safe anchorage for the weary sailor.

I encourage you, and members of your club to continue to sail in and enjoy the very things that make Treasure Island magical.



WHAT IS A YACHT CLUB?

A Yacht Club means different things to different members. Some like, the social functions, the galley, the bar, the reciprocity, and, yes, even the yachting.

There has been much talk around our club as to the future of the TIYC. Some advocate closing the club because we have no clubhouse. Did you know that 25% of the yacht clubs in the PICYA are in full operation without a clubhouse? As a matter of fact, the San Jose Sailing Club, that won 200 points, maximum that can be earned by any club in the PICYA, has no clubhouse! Hence, as you can see, the lack of a clubhouse should not handicap the yachting program of any yacht club that really wants to function.

On the other hand, there are many TIYC members who would like to see the club survive as a functional activity until a new clubhouse can be found. This was clearly evident at the General Membership Meeting and Dinner at the Ark Restaurant on Friday, 29 May A vote of confidence was taken of the 40 members in attendance and all were in favor of keeping the club in full operation, pending location of a new clubhouse.

My views on this subject were promulgated to the Bridge and Board via a memorandum which is presented here for information to the general membership.

THE FUTURE OF TIYC

1. Keep TIYC as a functional Yacht Club. Being without a clubhouse should not be a handicap.

- 2. The mission of TIYC would be as follows:
- A) Complete new social program.
- B) Full yachting program.
- C) Redesigned and larger Jibe.
- D) Reciprocity.
- 3. TIYC has 114 members. The club is one of the larger clubs in the Bay and Delta area. Many other clubs have less that 50 members and are in the PICYA.
- 4. An analysis of our members in the Club Roster shows that only 15% of our membership belong to another yacht club. Hence 85% of TIYC members depend upon our club for social and yachting activity.
- 5. Retention of the club name is very important, for future use. We are now in place, let's keep it that way.
- 6. The key concept underlining the above program is that management of our club should put top effort in trying to keep the club in full operation. They should install programs that attract and retain as many members as possible.






