


There was further discussion about date, time and location for a June TIYC meeting. This has since been firmed up for 9 June at the Berkeley Yacht Club

am writing this on Tuesday, May 23rd - somehow the date seems important to note since things seem to change fairly rapidly over time, and by the time you read this events may have moved things along.

First, and foremost, my son Patrick is doing extremely well. As many of you know he was involved in a

serious automobile accident on Sunday, May 7th and was hospitalized for eight days. He returned home on Monday the 15th and went back to school on the 22nd. His doctors have assured Patrick, Gail and me that there will be no permanent damage and that all of his scars will be covered by the traditionally thick Van Wye head of hair. Thanks for all of your kind thoughts and prayers.

Our next TIYC event will be the June 9th meeting and dinner at the Berkeley Yacht Club. Joyce and Harry's flyer looks great and we would really like to welcome you all aboard *Compass Rose* at the BYC guest dock both before and after the racing.

Things continue to progress favorably at Clipper Cove. The city staff is cooperating and the next step is to have a "walk-through" of Building 298 with the City's Department of Building Inspection and the Disability Council. We will then seek to get permission for sole-source negotiations from the T. I. Development Authority so that when Delancey Street's lease on the Crossroads Café comes up for renewal in September they will drop Building 298 and we will pick up the space in direct negotiations with the City. I know that this is taking longer than we had hoped - but remember we are dealing in both "boat time" and "government time" - and the combined effect . . . well, you understand.



As you know, earlier this year we embarked on a process to create a TIYC website on the Internet. To this end we began negotiations with a company out of Dallas called e\*Burgee. They have been acquired by a larger company called Lifecast.com which has great experience in creating "gated portals" for web access and already serves hundreds of country

clubs. They are now expanding their services to include yacht clubs.

I met with Lifecast.com representatives on Friday, May 19th, and will be making a report and favorable recommendation to the Bridge and Board on Tuesday, June 6th, and at the regular membership meeting on June 9<sup>th</sup> at Berkeley Yacht Club. The B&B meeting begins at 6:30PM and all are invited to attend.

Finally, keep in mind the Schreiber Cup race with the Oakland Yacht Club on Saturday, July 15th. We will be having dinner that evening at the OYC and hope for a large TIYC contingent that evening. The Schreiber Cup race is unique in that it starts off of the former Naval Air Station, goes around Treasure Island (clockwise or counter-clockwise, at the skipper's discretion) and finishes with a long downwind run to the OYC.

Again, thanks for all your expressions of sympathy as we have gone through a very trying experience. Although Patrick suffered a significant injury requiring about six months to fully recover, things could have been infinitely worse. Fortunately he will fully recover, and we are extremely grateful that the angel of death passed him by.

#### A TRAVEL NOTE

This past month has been a most enjoyable one for me as Nancy and I again traveled to Ireland, this time to assist her with a research project. Not being one to miss an opportunity, however, we availed ourselves of both a

beer and the local knowledge of the Kinsale Yacht Club, Kinsale, and a dinner by special invitation at the Royal Irish Yacht Club, Dun Laoghaire (a suburb of Dublin). I am happy to report that the TI burgee was gracefully accepted and is now in the possession of the Royal Irish for the usual display purposes.

The Royal Irish was founded in 1831, regretting that it is not the oldest yacht club in Ireland; that honor goes to the Royal Cork Yacht Club, founded in 1720. It's first Commodore was the Marquess of Anglesey, Colonel of the 7th Hussars. His boat was a modest 113 ton cutter, "Pearl". The club is quite beautiful with a dinner menu to match any fine restaurant; coat and tie mandatory, and by invitation only. Reciprocity will get you in the front door, but not to dinner. The club contested the America's Cup in 1903. The harbor containing the Royal Irish was designed by none other than Captain Bligh.

At Latitude 53, the Dublin area coast of Ireland is not exactly warm water. In the winter they take their boats out of the water or inland. The first of May brings launching all along the coast; it is a most interesting spectacle. The summer brings races such as "around the island", a 1,200 mile race, the record being 4 days.

All in all, a good time was had.




#### TIYC RATING IN THE YEAR 2000 PICYA "CLUB OF THE YEAR" STANDING

The official publication for the Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association (PICYA) is called LOG. It always contains reports on PICYA meetings and future calendars of Yacht Clubs in Northern California. The last page reads almost like a stock market report. It shows the attendance of clubs at different programs such as meetings, race participation, leadership and management conferences and activities in community service.

In the May/June 2000 issue, the Benicia YC has the highest rating with 66 points. TIYC stands at 31 points. There is a total of 200 points at the end of the year possible. The club with the highest number of points will receive the Club of Year award.

Jim Aberer's El Nido at dockside, Treasure Isle Marina, waiting for the party to start.





#### TIYC JAZZ CRUISE




Earl Ansley's boat FISHL-BIZNIS dockside at the Sacramento Yacht Club with Earl relaxing on the aft deck

#### Willow's return from the Bahamas

udith and I just returned from Willow's first trip out of the US. We spent three wonderful months in the Bahamas. This was following our trip from Pensacola to Marathon, Florida. We have been cruising now since December. While in the Bahamas, we visited Nassau, then went to many great anchorage's through out the many cays of the Exuma chain. Spent almost three weeks in Georgetown where we found two other Valiants. Decision V42 and ... Rose V40 (from Alameda). Rose was just returning from a 12 year circumnavigation. Then we went on to Long Cat Island. Island. several areat anchorages along Eleuthera. Freeport, Grand Bahama and now are moving up the US east coast toward the Chesapeake where we plan to spend the summer. We entered at Cape Canaveral and toured the Kennedy Space Center. We have also enjoyed tours of Saint Augustine and Savannah. This intercoastal waterway through the southern low country is fantastic. Day on day of winding rivers and quiet anchorages.

Willow sails like a dream. She is very fast on a beam reach and respectable upwind or down. We love the yankee cutter rig we chose. We mostly use the staysail and reefed main. Engine and generator have worked fine. entertaining aboard is possible. We had 10 for Christmas dinner. We have now logged over 2,000 miles with 350 engine hours and 200 genset hours in out first six months. Rarely do we play submarine through rough seas or strong winds but have seen winds to 40 knots and seas to ten feet. One morning we found 14 flying fish on deck after crossing the Gulf Stream.

Diving has also been great. The RIX compressor has kept my tanks full and I take every opportunity to dive. The best was a wall dive to 120' off Cat Island. We saw a reef shark and followed it down the wall where we discovered a new Danforth anchor which we were able to recover. Another great success has been the Spectra water maker. Between the generator and water maker, we rarely need to visit marinas. We upgraded the battery charging system in Marathon and installed a SALT battery monitoring system, this has really helped battery management.

The nicest part of cruising is the many great friends we have made along the way. We often find other boats to run with and most evenings are spent with cocktails in the cockpit. We will be leaving the boat for two weeks in Charleston while returning to California for a visit and for doctor appointments next month. I lost a crown and super glue only lasted so long. Then on to the Chesapeake hopefully before any hurricanes get frisky.

We thought we would have internet access while in the Bahamas via the ham radio but were never able to get it to work. Now in the US, we occasionally pick up email when we find marinas which allow us to hook up. Using our cell phone from the boat for internet or email has met with limited success. The cell system only uses a 4800 baud speed which normally allows interference to cut the connection before we down load.

## **BOATING SAFELY** "YOUTH PROGRAM"

recent issue of the Bay & Delta Yachtsman publication ran an article exemplifying the title of this column. The article titled, Heros Among Us detailed a fishing trip on the Sacramento River by a father and his nine year old son, that turned a possible fatal mishap into a life saving rescue...

The father had a bite on his line and hurriedly reached over the side of their aluminum boat to grab his fishing rod. Unfortunately, he fell overboard into the cold water and was quickly carried downstream by the current. His tenuous situation was exacerbated by his not wearing a life vest and being tangled in his own fishing line. His son started the outboard motor and then pulled up the anchor. He proceeded downstream to rescue his father, who had gone under at least one time. He placed the boat downstream of his father, secured the motor, and then grabbed his father so that he could grip the side of the boat. Not being able to get his father into the boat he signaled a passing boat with three adults on board, and they were able to extract him from the cold water, where he had been for more than twenty minutes.

It is fortunate that the nine year old son had prior on-the-water experience and training, that enabled him to effect the rescue, that undoubtedly saved his father's life.

For many years Bay Area Yacht Clubs have featured "Junior Sailing Programs". Unfortunately, no such programs were offered to power boat operators. Due to the ever increasing boating traffic on our waterways, boating mishaps have become a common occurrence, especially during the summer vacation months. Many yacht clubs have expressed the need for a Boating Safely Youth Program that would address the basic safety issues faced by sail and power boaters.

Recognizing this need, the International Order of the Blue Gavel (IOBG), District 14, is coordinating the **Boating Safely Youth Program** in conjunction with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, U.S. Power Squadron, PICYA and the California Department of Boating and Waterways. The program targets youths ages 12-17. The program consists of two four hour classroom sessions to be offered on separate mornings, taught by qualified Coast Guard Auxiliary and U.S. Power Squadron (USPS) Instructors. There is a \$10.00 fee per attendee for classroom text and material. The sponsoring yacht club(s) may want to amplify this program by presenting their own "on-thewater" exercises and or demonstrations in the afternoon.

The classroom course comprises:

- Your Boat and it's Equipment
- Safety and Legal Considerations
- Operating Your Boat
- Road Signs, Rivers and Rules

A parallel program for Kids, ages 11 years and younger: USPS Kids Program (shorter duration) special attention span adaption, one session, is also available.

Yacht clubs in the same area may opt to jointly sponsor this program. In addition, Vessel Safety Examinations (formerly called Courtesy Marine Examinations) for the sponsoring Yacht Club Fleet by the Coast Guard Auxiliary and USPS may be scheduled to coincide with the Boating Safely Program. Requests for Instructors and Vessel Safety Examiners should go to the coordinator:

#### TREASURE ISLAND YACHT CLUB

#### **Short History and Future Plans**

TIYC was formed in January, 1966 as a branch of the US Naval Sailing Association. The membership at the time was comprised of Active Duty, Retired and Reserve Uniformed Services Personnel of the US and foreign nations. It's military character allowed it to be sponsored on Treasure Island by the Morale Welfare & Recreations Department (MWR).

TIYC member volunteers contributed thousands of hours each year to the benefit of the T.I. Naval Station and the Naval Sailing Association. These volunteers assisted in the maintenance of the MWR's rental charter sailing fleet, conducting sail training for the service members and their dependents, as well as conducting a highly successful *Junior Sailing Program*, and participating in fleet wide, regional and local Sail Racing events.

TIYC conducted weekly Friday night series regattas for active duty, retired, reserve personnel and their dependents. The Club campaigned their Rhodes 19 Fleet for the Navy in the annual *Nimitz Sports Competition....* Olympic Club/St. Francis Yacht Club vs. the Pacific Fleet. This week long event began in 1939, and encompassed various land competitions as well as Team Racing (sail).

TIYC conducted the annual Navy Central Pacific Championship Sailing Competition from 1987 through 1993. The Club represented the Naval Station in bi-monthly team sailing competition with NAS Alameda and Naval Station Mare Island. In addition to these events, the club conducted monthly *Club Races*, spring through fall for the past 15 years. The Club sponsored and conducted races and regattas for the YRA, San Francisco Bay and the Small Boat Racing Association (National and Local events). Many of it's members participated in YRA and other racing events on San Francisco Bay, as well as National and International competitions.

TIYC's location at Clipper Cove makes it one of the most favored *Cruise-in* and *Small Boat Racing* locations in the region. The Club has a very active *Cruise Program* that operates monthly during the spring and fall.

TIYC has been a long standing member of the PICYA and looks forward to entertaining member club *Cruise-ins* commencing this spring. The City of San Franciso has finally settled on a new marina developer.... the Almar Corporation, who has been highly supportive of our return and participation in the development of the new 403-slip Treasure Island Marina. Pending construction of our new clubhouse, we are negotiating leasing space from the Delancy Street Foundation now operating at our former facilities, in order to establish temporary quarters. This will allow us to resume on-the-water activities.... hosting member club cruise-ins, racing events and provide us with the opportunity to re-establish our presence on San Francisco Bay.

TIYC has been a good neighbor to the *US Navy* and the *Boating Community* of the region. As we make our transition from a military orientated entity to civilian status, we intend to increase our community activities and extend our civilian membership base; while still remembering and honoring our Naval heritage. As a current member of the PICYA, YRA S.F. Bay and the Naval Sailing Association, we look forward to re-energizing our participation with these associations.


