

FROM THE REAR COMMODORE Len Cardoza

(Apologies Len, I don't yet have a picture of you.. Dave)

Planning for organized cruise-outs has certainly become more difficult since the last time I have done this for TIYC, at large, about 5 years ago! Some of our favorite destinations (San Rafael and Petaluma turning basins) have shoaled in. Commercial destinations (South Beach and Pier 39) have become very expensive!

South Beach Harbor. Three boats have signed up for the cruise-out to South Beach Harbor April 27-28. I will try to provide more information, in advance, for our next cruises. South Beach requested a non-refundable fee, three months in advance, to confirm reservations. If you are interested in participating in the cruise, you can call South Beach Harbor, 415 495 4911 to check on slips on a space-available basis.

China Camp is a great China Camp. destination for an anchor-out in May. It is particularly popular as an overnight anchorage for boats bound for or returning from the Delta. China Camp State Park is located on the southwest side of San Pablo Bay, about one nautical mile northwest of Point San Pedro. The state park features a collection of buildings in "arrested decay", together with a nice little museum interpreting the last of remnant of the shrimping/fishing communities located around the bay in the 1800's. For check information. out www.calparks.ca.gov. We have experienced good holding ground (mud), in 6 feet of depth, Mean Lower Low Tide, about 300 yards from the beach, near the long pier. There is deeper water further out. The tidal currents can make anchoring a challenge. We use a

Bruce anchor with at least 5 to 1 scope. We also employ a smaller, "mushroom" anchor, suspended on the same rode as the main anchor, about 10 feet down from our anchor roller, to feel secure. purpose of the smaller anchor is to keep the rode on the bottom, and off our fin keel, when the tide changes and the rode becomes slack. Otherwise, the rode can wrap around our keel. This generally happens during the middle of the night, just as the wind increases. China Camp has a very nice beach, generally protected from prevailing winds. There are many trails and It is one of our favorite picnic areas. destinations in the Bay. Let me know if you would like to participate in the cruise or information would like more (route/anchoring/sea stories).

Marin Yacht Club. It is not too early to start planning for our cruise to Marin Yacht Club June 22-23. Please let me know how many boats would like to participate. (Owner/operator, # in crew, boat name, length, beam, draft).

On the next page is a tentative schedule for cruises in 2002. Much thanks to **Bob Rapasky** and **Sandra Aberer** for their input / assistance. I continue to welcome other club members who would like to help me with the cruising committee. We are receptive to all ideas for cruise-outs.

IMPORTANT NOTICE!!!

The PICYA LOG advises the following in the light of recent events.

FLY YOUR BURGEE!! It is recommended that you fly your club burgee at all times. This is a way to identify you and may reduce your chance of being boarded by the Coast Guard. If you do not presently have a TIYC burgee and wish to purchase one contact me. Burgees cost \$30.00 and will be mailed to you upon receipt of your check made out to TIYC. [send to me at 312 Juanita Avenue, Millbrae, CA 94030]

It is also recommended that you keep clear of sensitive areas. Stay at least 2,000 yards away from both the San Francisco and Oakland Airports. Sensitive areas also include, but are not restricted to, bridge towers, refinery docks, anchored vessels and military installations such as Port Chicago.

Boaters are also advised to stay 100 yards away from a U.S. Naval vessel unless authorized by an official patrol.

We will be conducting training sessions for Race Committee hopefuls, as well as for those skippers and crew-members interested in Sail Racing. The starting rules have changed and it is imperative that "racers" study the new rules and attend our forthcoming training workshops.

I have placed a limited number of manuals in the club office for those interested in getting a jump-start. US Sailing Association's The Racing Rules of Sailing

2001-2004 and their entry level publication: Join The Race Committee Team published by the Race Management Committee of the US Sailing Association, the governing body for the sport of sailing. Both of these publications may be purchased for \$15.00 US. There are no longer Yellow, Blue and Red starting Shapes or Flags, reference the following from the Schreiber Cup Racing Instructions.

Course Description:

The Race starts in the vicinity of Red Buoy 6 at the entrance to the Oakland Estuary, rounds Treasure Island (either direction), rounds Red 6 to port, the finish line will be positioned abeam the OYC dock (Race committee boat and marker).

Please log onto the TIYC Website (www.tiyc.org) for complete racing instructions and entry application, there is no entry fee for this event.

Central Bay Opening Day: The Coast Guard Seagoing Buoy Tender WLB 208 Aspen is scheduled to be the "Blessing Vessel" on Sunday April 28, 200. The Aspen is the newest of this class tender. She is equipped with a single controllablepitch propeller as well as bow and stern thrusters She incorporates the GPS-linked dynamic positioning system, which fixes the ship's position within a two-meter accuracy and allows the cutter to approach, maneuver, and automatically maintain position within a radius of 10 meters. Her displacement is 2,000 tons, Length 225 ft., Beam 46 ft. Speed 15 kts. Range 6,000 nautical miles, Armament two .50 caliber machine guns, Compliment 40. She is home-ported at YBI, our next-door neighbor.

America's Cup Update: There are presently 5 syndicates training full time in Auckland's Harauki Gulf. Golden Gate Yacht Club's team, Oracle Racing, is one of them, the two 1999 boats, USA 49 and USA 61, are getting a constant workout. The new boats are under construction at Oracle's top secret California facility. They are due to be launched this spring, then they head to Ventura for tuning and testing before being shipped to New Zealand.

Dennis Conner's Stars and Stripes team, has launched their first boat and are getting ready to start training off Long Beach before shipping her to Auckland. The other American syndicate, ONEWORLD, out of Seattle, is still working toward being a contender.

Race officials expect at least 10 boats ready to compete for the opportunity to defeat Black Magic and the Kiwi syndicate. Louis Vuttion Cup racing commences near the end of October this year. The America's Cup competition will take place the first week of March 2003.

O what a tangled Web we weave.. Dave Shuttleworth

I'm sure by now you'll be aware that the club has a 'web presence' – in the form of the website which is now up and running at the web address www.tiyc.org. The home page is shown on the front cover of this edition of the JIBE.

To put the minds at rest of all who do not (yet!) have access to the web, all important news and club business (for example the recent new Constitution and Bylaws) will continue to be communicated by other means including printed mailings, e-mails and of course via the JIBE (which is now available either in hardcopy, e-mail or web versions).

However, even though the website has only been widely available since early March, it's already been proved that it works very well as a way of disseminating timely and accurate news, as well as being a useful repository for more fixed information such as club rosters, constitution and bylaws, etc. At the time of writing, around 250 individuals have visited the site.

In the paragraphs below I've tried to explain some of the basics of the site (incorporating answers to some questions I've already recieved). But if you have any questions regarding the website (or better still, comments, suggestions and additional material) please contact me via any of the methods listed on page 2 of this JIBE.

Web site navigation - I hope the layout of the website is easy to understand and use - the idea is that the area on the left of the screen (with the white background) stays unchanged, so you can use this to jump around to the different sections of the website. The actual content for each page

appears on the main part of the screen, with the blue background. You can of course define any (or all!) pages within the 'Favourites' section on your web browser, so you can jump to that page directly whenever you want to.

Links — in common with most websites, when there's relevant information regarding a given topic on some other part of the site (or even out on another website) I've tried to put a link in the text. These will typically underlined and in blue like this. This means that you can click on this text, and you'll jump directly to the relevant page. To get back to where you came from, use the 'Back' button on your browser.

A good example of this is on the home page in the second paragraph of text (see the picture on the front cover) where the words 'historic Clipper Cove' are highlighted in this way. Clicking on this text takes you to a great page I found on the SF Museum website which has pictures of Clipper Cove in 1939-40 with flying boats moored just in front of where the current clubhouse stands. Try it!

I also use links as a short cut to your e-mail system in places where you might want to contact me, Joyce Waters (or whoever is appropriate). Clicking these should create a 'skeleton' e-mail message with that person's e-mail address and the subject already filled in. All you have to do is add the message text and send it.

'Latest News' page — I've used this technique successfully on other websites, so I thought I'd incorporate it here too. This is a 'one stop' location on the site where you can go to see latest announcements, reminders of imminent events, and a list of what's changed on the website. The idea is that it's a handy way to keep up with what's



happening currently on the site and at the club. It's probably worth having this page set up in your browser 'favorites' section so you can jump straight to it. It's also possible to register to be notified by e-mail when this page changes — I was initially linking to a free service called NetMind to achieve this — but it seems that NetMind has just curtailed it's free service, so instead I'm now handling this myself. To register, click the link at the top left of the 'Latest news' page to send me an e-mail.

Pictures and graphics — You'll have noticed if you've used the site that I like to add the occasional little graphic on each page. The idea is to make the site more interesting and attractive to visitors. Also, in case you haven't already realized, if you 'hover' your cursor over these graphics, there's usually a caption (sometimes humorous!) that will pop up.

This also happens on the 'photo pages' in the 'Gallery' section of the site. I've taken the approach of putting a small version of each picture on a page with several others, but with the ability to view a bigger version of each picture by clicking on it. If you see a picture you'd like a better quality copy of, please let me know – and conversely, if you have any pictures suitable for the website please let me have them (I can scan in prints and then return the originals, or I'll accept any format of digital image).

Member Only area – While most of the site is available and open to general visitors, there are some things that we want to be accessible to members only. To get into this part of the site, you must first enter a username and password – these were sent out in the initial e-mail message announcing the website, but if you don't know what they are contact me.

Currently in the Member's section we have the 'On-line Store' with pictures and prices of the latest TIYC merchandise, the Watch Duty list for 2002, the on-line archives of the JIBE (where you can browse or download this and previous editions of the JIBE), and the 'on-line library' which is intended to contain current versions of important club documents. Current contents include the Club Roster, Constitution, By-Laws, Membership application forms and Watch Duties.

Publicity – While it's a great resource for members, the website is also a very public 'shop window' for the club and should be a good point of contact for potential new members and clubs looking for cruise-out venues etc. To make us more 'visible' on the web, I've contacted many bay area sailing clubs and organizations such as PICYA to inform them of the new site and request that they create a link to us from their site. Most have done this and I can see from my monitoring software that we're already getting hits from many of these clubs.

On a broader front, I've registered the site (with appropriate description and keywords) with about 10 of the major web search engines (including Yahoo, Lycos and Google). This will take several weeks to be actioned, but when completed it will mean that anyone searching the web for, say, 'bay area sailing' will get a link to our site.

What now? Well I still have many ideas, including a 'guestbook' so that on-line visitors can leave comments, and an interactive bulletin board in the members section. But the beauty of a website is that we can change it as necessary – and all suggestions are welcome!






