

FROM THE REAR COMMODORE Len Cardoza

(Apologies Len, I *STILL* don't yet have a photo of you – Dave.)

Excerpts from Kachina's Log, April 27-28, 2002:

TIYC's first "official" cruise in 2002 went Four boats ended up extremely well. participating: The Cardozas (Len, Barbara, Liesel, Brianna, and Skarlett, giant white poodledog) aboard Kachina; Jim and Sandy Aberer aboard El Nido; The McBains (Ken, Yvonne, and stalwart proper seadog Sandy) aboard Rattler; and Earl Ansley and Jeannine aboard Fishl-Biznis. Forecasted conditions were grim for Saturday, April 27. Gale force winds outside the Golden Gate, small craft warnings inside. Gusts to 45 KTS. Cold temperatures, scattered showers, shivers and frowns.

The Kachinas arrived at T.I Marina Saturday morning, coiled up and stowed the dirty gray/yellow "snake" (electrical cord), and departed, bound for South Beach Harbor, 1 1/5 nautical miles (NM) away if you are a puffin; 3 NM away if you are a puffin driving a powerboat; and 5 NM away if you are a puffin watching a sailboat (puffins are too advanced on the evolutionary scale for sailing).

Kachina departs Clipper Cove late morning, unfurled about 90% of jib. Prudent (cowardly) Skipper sets a double-reefed main in lee of Yerba Buena Isle, and heads for South Beach Harbor on a series of close tacks (wig-wagging to power boaters). Strong flood tide sets us to the south on starboard tack, then we claw our way back to the north on port tack. Took some hard gusts, but actually a nice sail! Arrived at

South Beach Harbor to find....another sailboat in Kachina's assigned slip! Found a vacant slip, temporarily secured vessel, and headed to Harbor Master to check in. Marina staff sent "interloper" on its way. Positioned Kachina in her properly assigned slip hooked up the ugly "snake", and heated up a pot of seafood/noodle soup. Just the ticket!

Took seadog for a walk on shore. Met some interesting people ("ve hove no soch dogs in Russia"). Secured seadog on board and prepared for Pier 39 adventure. Following instructions from my counterpart (dredging guy) at the Port of San Francisco, we hopped on the muni tram in front of the Harbor, making sure that we each acquired a transfer (\$1 apiece for Skipper and Mate. \$.35 apiece for urchins. We transferred to the historical electrical rail cars at the Ferry Bldg, and rode all the way to Pier 39. Shopped for overpriced trinkets; consumed treats (I actually enjoyed a rather good fried calamari and chips!); shopped again; watched a juggling act; more shopping; watched tourists watching sea lions; more shopping.

Re-traced our steps (rides) back to South Beach Harbor, still working off of the same dog-eared transfers! What a transportation In the meantime, the other TIYC vessels have arrived and properly secured in their assigned slips. Vice Commodore Sandy Aberer, TIYC, had arranged for evening meal at Max's (coincidently previously recommended to the Kachinas by a street person). Mate and teen urchin "freshen up" while Skipper and "perpetually going through a phase" urchin take seadogs for a walk. Yes...Seadogs! Sandy (from the McBain's Rattler) decided to come along...actually she led the way, heading west along the dock in a purposeful, leashless manner. Skipper grabs first line he



could find, an old halyard, about 80 Ft. long, and gives chase. After going up and down several docks, he manages to throw bowline through Sandy's collar, and all go for a short walk. Was actually kind of fun, "sheeting out" Sandy on a broad reach, then... (ready about! hard a-lee!), hauling in the slack before tacking in a different direction.

Return to vessels in time to secure a more presentable shirt from the slop chest. Kachinas join the rest of TIYC for a great meal at Max's. Return to vessels, carrying "doggy bags" for Sunday's lunch. Sorry sea-dogs! Invited aboard the Aberer's magnificent Grand Banks for after dinner drinks, cookies, and strawberries. Have a great visit. Skipper discovers a kindred spirit. Turns out that the "boat bird" of the "El Nido" is none other than the Skippers favorite Puffin!

All TIYC crews retire for a quiet night. In spite of dire forecast, Sunday dawns very Skipper takes seadog for a pleasant. morning walk, and scores a couple of good coffees from Red's Java House for him and Mate. Skipper and Mate take seadog for long walk after breakfast, circum-navigating new Giants Stadium Pac Bell Park, and return to prepare Kachina for "voyage" back to TI. Depart about 11:00. Set full main and jib, under light winds, to head back. Watch vessels heading to Opening Day on the Bay festivities...watch same vessels heading back...while another strong flood tide sets Kachina to the South Bay. Finally give up looking for wind at noon...finish the remainder of the trip, skulking to homeport under power. Great cruise!

ABC rules regarding yacht club membership and guests. George C, Knies

I was requested to place information regarding our Club Liquor License and how it differs from an unrestricted license. See extracts below.

Alcohol Beverage Control Act California

23427 YACHT CLUB

For the purpose for this article "club" also means any yacht club which is a nonprofit organization and is a regular member of a recognized national nonprofit yachting organization having a membership of not less than 200 member yacht clubs, which owns, maintains, or operates a clubhouse.

23437 Restriction of off-sale privileges

Notwithstanding any other provision of this division, no club license issued under this article shall entitle the holder to any off-sale privileges.

23431 License privileges

The holder of a club license may exercise all of the rights and privileges permitted by an on-sale general license but may sell and serve alcoholic beverages for consumption within the licensed establishment only to bona fide members of the club.

23037 "Club," "guest"

"Club" means a corporation or association which is the owner, lessee, or occupant or an establishment operated solely for objects of a social or athletic nature but not pecuniary gain, having a bona fide membership list and the majority of the members of which pay dues at least once in every year, and the property as well as the

advantages of which belong to the members, and which sells alcoholic beverages only to its members and its bona fide guests. A guest is defined as a person who is actually a house-guest, or a person whose presence as a guest is in response to a specific invitation for the special occasion.

23027 Guest

A bona fide guest is one of the following:

- (a) A person invited and accompanied by a member.
- (b) A person not accompanied by a member but who holds a written invitation signed by a member extending the hospitality, facitilities, services of the club for a specified period of time.
- (c) A member of one unit of a multi-unit club organization who is visiting another unit of the same organization and whose membership card states thereon that such member is entitled to guest privileges at all other units of the organization.
- (d) A member of particular type club, such as a yacht club, who is visiting another club of the same type and whose membership card states thereon that such member is entitled to a guest privileges at other designated clubs which have negotiated a written reciprocal agreement for the purpose.

Some more of the lesser known boating terms:

BOW: What you do (along with scape) in front of your banker when you are asking for more money to spend on your vessel.

DECK: What your spouse will do to you after discovering how much money you spent without first obtaining permission.

DOCK: A medical professional.

TIYC represented in Master Mariner's Regatta Steve Barber

The TIYC Burgee will be flying in the annual Master Mariners race for woodies on May 25th. TIYC member, POLA - a Bear boat (hull #8) built in 1938, is having her bottom tended to and painted, her mast and boom varnished, and a number of other age and weather related items being addressed this week at the Berkeley boatyard. **Scott Wild**, owner of FLARE a Kettenburg 38 and earnest boatwright, is doing the work for POLA's owner with the wise and able counsel of longtime boatwright and builder **David Caissie**.

Her original builder, John Vincent of Richmond, is still alive and looking forward to a day or two of sailing in May as POLA gets ready for the race. As a boy growing up in Richmond John Vincent was a avid sailor. As a young man and chemical engineer for Standard of CA (he was on the team that invented DELO motor oil for diesels, and he invented the grease used to help launch Liberty ships when the parafin used on the "weighs" melted under the friction of launch). He built POLA between 1936 and 1938 in a shack abandoned by the Southern Pacific RR in Richmond, even using some of the yellow paint they left behind. POLA was the first BEAR built outside the Nunes Bros. yard using their plans (they would rent them to people and sell materials to home builders as many were unable afford to have Nunes Bros. build the boats due to the depression).

POLA was launched from her build site and the next day, her shakedown run, she was entered into the race which inaugurated the 1939 World's Fair. As she was sailing to the start her builder was in the cabin sewing up the jib!!! AND guess what?? She won the

race!!! This story is featured in the WoodenBoat magazine article about BEARS on the Bay.

IMPORTANT NOTICE!!!

The PICYA LOG advises the following in the light of recent events.

FLY YOUR BURGEE!! It is recommended that you fly your club burgee at all times. This is a way to identify you and may reduce your chance of being boarded by the Coast Guard. If you do not presently have a TIYC burgee and wish to purchase one contact me. Burgees cost \$30.00 and will be mailed to you upon receipt of your check made out to TIYC. [send to me at 312 Juanita Avenue, Millbrae, CA 94030]

It is also recommended that you keep clear of sensitive areas. Stay at least 2,000 yards away from both the San Francisco and Oakland Airports. Sensitive areas also include, but are not restricted to, bridge towers, refinery docks, anchored vessels and military installations. Boaters are also advised to stay 100 yards away from a U.S. Naval vessel unless authorized by an official patrol.



UPRIVER ON THE "COMPASS ROSE" TO SACRAMENTO Harlan Van Wye



Commodores Kent Brewer and Harlan Van Wye recently completed a 10-day voyage on "Compass Rose", their 36' Catalina sloop to the Sacramento Yacht Club and the annual Memorial Day Sacramento

Jazz Jubilee. The trip was eventful, the hospitality was exceptional and the music was, as the French say: "le jazz hot!"

Harlan, along with regular Compass Rose crew members Carl Goeriz and Dale Smith found a window between rainstorms on Sunday, May 19th leaving Treeasure Island around 3:25 PM and arriving at Pittsburg Yacht Club at 8:16 -- a 4 hour, 51 minute passage greatly aided by good winds and currents! Gail Van Wye picked up the intreped crew at the PYC guest dock where the Rose remained until Thursday morning, May 23rd.

Kent and his son Jeff were dropped off that morning at PYC by Nancy Brewer. They got a bit of a late start due to some apparent battery problem and shoved off around 11:30 AM. They refueled at Hidden Harbor (after discovering that Snug Harbor doesn't have diesel fuel) and proceded up Steamboat Slough. Slowed by heavy currents and some electrical fluctuations, and with night coming on they put into Cliff's Marina at Freeport -- 9 miles short of the Sacramento Yacht Club.

Meanwhile, Harlan heard cases in Suisun City that morning and went flying at the Travis Flying Club. He arrived at the Sacramento Yacht Club around 7:00 PM to discover no Compass Rose. Fortunately

Jim and Sandy Aberer were there on "El Nido" and had an available berth for the night. That evening was spent socializing with friends new and old from the Sacramento and Pittsburg Yacht Clubs.

Up early the next morning, Harlan headed south down the river road to Freeport to see if he could lend a hand or drive into Sacramento if Compass Rose needed a spare part not immediately available, having recieved a call from Kent concerning the electrical problems. As he was about to cross the drawbridge at Freeport the bells and lights go off and the bridge begins to open. Looking downriver . . . well, you guessed it, **Jeff Brewer** is an electrical whiz who fixed the problem.

Compass Rose docked at SYC around 10:30 Friday morning, moored third boat out beside a trawler and an Islander 36'. The afternoon was spent resting and socializing. That evening the crew drove into Sacramento and attended the Jazz Jubilee. We heard some teriffic music, particularly at the Firehouse Courtyard, including **Bob Drago** -- one of the best claranetists any of us had ever heard.

Saturday morning Nancy drove up with Jeff's wife **Sarah** and Dale Smith. All of us went to the afternoon session of the Jubilee in Old Town Sacramento. We attended four one-hour sets at various venues and returned to the SYC around 6:00 PM. Dinner at the Club that night was steak and chicken, and we socialized with the **Peters** and the **Ainsleys** who also motored up on "I Away" and "Fishl-Bzness". Jeff, Nancy and Sarah drove home, and the remaining crew slept well.

Sunday morning dawned bright and early. Some of us had breakfast at the Club while at least one other field tested the aft berth.



Gail and Patrick drove up from Orinda, arriving at around 11 AM. No amount of friendly cajoling could convince my "Generation Y" guy that he'ld enjoy the music downtown, so he got a pass on the Jubilee and drove "Sea Rose" home. Dale, Kent, Gail and I then drove in to Old Town and enjoyed the afternoon, catching four groups in four venues along with some spicy jambalaya at the New Orleans Cafe. Again, the music was varied and uniformly good, the weather was perfect and a great time was had by all.

That evening found us at dinner at the SYC, followed by a fun show and presentation with lots of audience participation -- just ask Kent who kept the hat the longest! Gail decided to drive home, and the remaining three of us slept overnight on "Compass Rose."

Monday morning is getaway day, and the 150-boat visiting raftup breaks as the clock strikes 10AM. Breakfast was over for us around 8:30 and since we were an outboard sailboat the Port Captain kindly permitted us to depart early. We were on our way by 8:45.

The weather remained beautiful and we made good time going downstream. Two and a half hours to Steamboat Slough, and by 12:45 we were back on the Sacramento River at Rio Vista. The Slough was picturesque -- particularly on its Northern end -- but watch out for rude gestures when passing Snug Harbor if you dare to make even the tiniest wake. We were held up for about 20 minutes at the Rio Vista drawbridge due to us just missing an opening and the very heavy Memorial Day vehicular traffic. We finally got under way again and arrived at the Pittsburg Yacht Club docks around 3:45 PM.

Kent had some pressing matters to attend to at home so Nancy met him at PYC and he debarked. We were having some minor battery problems so we changed out an old battery, topped off our water tanks, and were under way around 4:30.

The plan was for us to head home to Treasure Island, but to put in to Benecia or Vallejo and remain overnight if the weather so dictated. We made good time on a fovorable current and the winds remained mild. We cleared the Carquinez Bridge at 7:30 with an hour or so of daylight remaining and decided to push on to TI.

Night fell somewhere between Points Pinole and San Pablo, and we aimed for the East Brother Island Lighthouse. We passed under the Eastern Span of the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge at 9:27, and slipped in behind a huge tanker coming light out of the Chevron docks attended by four brightly lit tugboats. The GPS locked on Southhampton Shoals light three miles ahead, switched to the Northeast corner of Treasure Island and we proceded on through the starry night, arriving at our dock around 10:30.

Gail was there to meet us and take us back to the Brewers' and then to home. What a neat experience! I think that all of us who went on a part of the trip want to really recommend it to all of you. It would be great to see a large TIYC upriver turnout in the years to come.

"Sail of the Year" Fred Beauchemin

Just want to share an exciting, adrenaline experience with you. It was so great I can't keep it to myself. It happened Easter Sunday, March 31. On Saturday, I had participated in the "Blessing of the Fleet" aboard "HOBO", my 26 foot steel ketch.

When the ceremonies were over we (Hobo & I) just enjoyed a beautiful day of no destination sailing in the Gulf of Mexico and St Andrew Bay. Anchored for the night behind Shell Island and awoke to dense fog on Sunday AM.

Plotted and ran a GPS route to Tyndall Yacht Club for food, fuel, ice and to wait a fog burn-off prior to a run around the island (out the newly re-opened East Pass and run down the outside before a previously forecast 10 knot SE breeze).

The fog didn't burn and the new forecast warned of a damaging line of vicious thunderstorms rapidly making it's way eastward across the Gulf Coast -- due to arrive late afternoon or early evening. Changed plans and decided to head home solo across St Andrew Bay, along the ICW and up North Bay (12 miles) in 10 knot east-southeast breeze, but still in fog.

Plotted courses, ran up the radar reflector, placed fog horn at elbow, filed float plan with neighbor, and headed out via compass, GPS, charts, VHF Ch.16 and local knowledge. Fog is always "fun" (anxious can also be fun).

Half-way home, just off Port Panama City, fog cleared and a stronger SSE breeze started to fill in. By the time I passed through Hathaway Bridge, normally about 65 minutes SW-NE fast cruise from home, it

was blowing 20-25, and I was enjoying a brisk sail under full main, mizzen and working jib.

As it intensified and whitecap chop surrounded us, Hobo quickly reached hull speed throwing some spray and loving the open broad reach. Very quickly, it became obvious a real blow was making up, so I hove to and in about ten minutes of pitching & howling had a reef secured in the main --wondering if that would be enough.

Back on course and throwing a bow wave higher than the coaming above the gunnels, spray everywhere (tops of whitecaps blowing off), and me with a great big grin --- loving it as much as Hobo was. It was a fantastic ride, but too short. Even with at least a ten minute pause to reef, we made the 65 minute run in less than 45 minutes.

Home early, well before the storm, I closed the float plan, cleaned up, buttoned up and secured Hobo on her mooring -- all the while reliving the excitement of this "Sail of the Year". Hopefully, you too can share the fun vicariously.






